Each day this August, Project Space Festival will take visitors to every corner of the city to question their relationship to time and space and their role in Berlin's changing urban landscape. Forget the image of a traditional gallery and instead imagine a place to fill gaps in the city or temporarily occupy spaces, from a former embassy to a Lithuanian tea-stall.

Now in its fourth year, Project Space Festival spans 31 days, 27 project spaces and features two panel discussions. Although the influx of investment capital into the city has impacted the ecology of its free urban spaces, the spirit of the project is still very much alive. The breadth and diversity of the festival's

program reflects a city with communities and spaces committed to maintaining their vibrant creative scene.

The festival organizers describe their program as "fearless and direct, charming and seductive," where artist and audience come together to activate dialogues between the contemporary and the historical, within Berlin's own artistic communities and beyond.

With a packed schedule to sift through, here are some of the events that caught our attention.

"Fault lines": Saturday, Aug. 4, 2018 at x-embassy, 3 p.m.



artists have research-led practices that are based in the cultural intersectionalities, aiming to develop of women who cultivated the tea and from whom it was purchased. This one day event is inspired by the market and examines the historical narratives surrounding tea as a social place of exchange. Both markets and cultures. 

If you need something stronger than tea, Pub Crawl is a one day event, during which Farbvision will host three separate artist-run bars situated within a single room. Each bar will have a distinct identity, conceived of as an artwork in itself. The aim is to explore how collaborative practices work, in that they can be simultaneously cooperative and combative. All three artists will work on this project together but ultimately each will offer a different experience. Farbvision itself is situated within a former butcher's shop directly on a busy section of Schönhauser Allee. The most distinctive feature of the room is its decorative wall tiles, which offer exhibiting artists a unique exhibition environment and provide an existing visual structure to respond to.
